Settled by Europeans in 1788, the City of Long Beach was Sincorporated in 1905. Long Beach is known as the "Friendly City", a name chosen by its early citizens whose courage, commitment and perseverance helped them to overcome obstacles as they developed their community. Many of today's residents are descended from these early settlers, and the name still applies as residents continue to help each other work for the benefit of their "bedroom community".

The sandy beachfront is marked by lovely live oaks, including the five-century old Friendship Oak, a mere sapling when Columbus discovered America. The Long Beach Harbor and Marina is home to recreational and fishing charter boats and is undergoing an expansion and upgrade to accommodate an increase in waterrelated development. The downtown buildings and storefronts reflect the community's historic heritage. There is a weekly Farmer's Market on Jeff Davis Avenue, the main street, and several new eateries. The new Harper McCaughan Town Green is a hub of recreation with a large park, performance amphitheater and picnic spaces surrounded by lush landscaping and fountains. With over 2,800 students, the University of Southern Mississippi's Gulf Coast campus calls the city of Long Beach home.


