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Dass Christian (pronounced Pass Chris-tee-ANN), fondly known as "the Pass", was explored in 1699, but its heyday came in the mid-nineteenth century as a transportation hub for trade further north and as a resort city, providing rest and relaxation to New Orleanians and other urban-dwellers. In the 1850's, Pass Christian was the most populated town on the Mississippi coast with over 6,000 permanent residents and many more summer visitors. Gulfport constructed a north-south rail line and deep water port in the early 1900's which lessened the Pass's importance as a trade center. In the wake of Hurricane Katrina, the Pass has rebuilt its city hall and public library, yacht club and marina. The city boasts one of the largest oyster beds on the coast, and fresh oysters and shrimp can still be purchased from the boats arriving in the harbor. Today, the Pass is a delightful bedroom-community, and its public school district is the highest ranked in the state, with Pass Christian High School being declared a National Blue Ribbon School in 2005 and 2012. It is also a well-visited tourist attraction, known for its festivals, such as the Oyster Festival and Art in the Pass.


MS BLUES TRAIL
